

Which Honors Pathway is right for you?

Weber High has opportunities for students to pursue rigorous coursework, prepare for college level academics and potentially earn college credit. Talk with your teachers and counselor to determine the best collection of courses for you!

Concurrent Enrollment (CE)

What is it?

Classes earn high school and college credit at the same time.

One-time admissions fee (\$30) + \$5 per credit hour.

Courses may have prerequisites or ACT requirements.

Students purchase books.

CE Students are typically:

Want guaranteed credit without the risk of a high stakes test.

Plan to attend the CE university and have a specific program in mind.

Want to free up space in their schedule as most CE classes are only a semester long.

Interested in a specific content area (Health Professions)

Advanced Placement (AP)

What is it?

Classes are advanced college preparatory classes. Students can earn college credit through an end of year high stakes test.

Students may or may not choose to take the AP exam. Registration fee is \$94 per exam. Financial assistance is available to those that qualify.

School provides books.

Courses are a year long and may have prerequisites.

AP Students are typically:

Good test takers that excel at high stakes testing.

Have a strong interest in one or two specific courses

Take courses that play to their strength areas.

International Baccalaureate (IB)

What is it?

A holistic program where students take six IB courses in addition to Theory of Knowledge, service learning and writing an Extended Essay. IB students focus on global issues and giving back to the community.

All IB courses are writing, research and inquiry based.

Students test in all six IB courses and can earn the IB Diploma in addition to their high school diploma. Students can earn up to 30 college credit hours depending on the university.

The cost of exams is \$119 per course.

IB Students are typically:

Driven to achieve in all areas and are interested in many subject areas - not just areas of strength.

Want to apply their learning to real world situations

Finds joy in learning about a variety of subjects.

Students can pick a combination of AP and CE courses that best suit their needs and goals. Students in the IB program can stack credit by testing in both AP and the corresponding IB courses. For example, IB History & AP US History. This allows for students to create a schedule that provides the depth and breadth of knowledge in specific areas of learning.

Please note that while some IB Courses prepare students for the corresponding AP exam, AP Courses DO NOT prepare students for the corresponding IB exam. Students may not sit for an IB exam without taking the corresponding IB course.
